Gifted writer encourages readers to seek out and name the expansiveness of God

Mallory Wyckoff—teacher, preacher, writer, and spiritual director—takes readers on a journey of More in her new book, *God Is*. Wyckoff explores feminine and untapped language and metaphors for God—some biblical and familiar, others less well-known, but all revelatory of a God who is More than we've been allowed to imagine. She offers up her own spiritual journey to encourage readers to reconsider their “small” view of God—and of themselves.

“I’ve set out to write about the expansiveness of God because there are too many energies that resist this notion, that seek to keep God—and humanity—small,” she says in *God Is*. “It’s as if many believe that one image of God is sufficient, capable of holding all that we are and all that will be, able to contain all that God is. But my reality has never reflected that.”

Wyckoff’s lyrical prose, full of her humor and wide range of experiences, pulls readers into new ways of looking at God and the many expressions of the Divine. Chapters include:

- God is Midwife
- God Is Hostess
- God Is Sexual Trauma Survivor

Her goal is to encourage readers to name God wherever and however they sense the Divine, in the process finding that they see themselves—and their neighbors—more fully. Bonus material includes practices and reflections to help readers further engage in *God Is* for themselves or in groups.

“I’m just one finger pointing at the universe I inhabit, with my own particularities and limitedness and faults. But I’ll keep pointing up, trying to describe what I see,” Wyckoff says. “I’ll keep listening for voices as diverse as the God who made humanity in her image, as together in our own languages we seek to name The God Who Is.”

Suggested Interview Questions

- You say that “A small God—a small you—has never served the world.” Explain what you mean by that.
- How did finding yourself hiding under a table in the Luke 7 story, and Jesus coming to join you there, change the trajectory of your faith and life?
- How does what we believe about God inform what we believe about everything and everyone?
- How do the social and cultural structures that shape our views of women also shape our views of God? How can both be liberated, the walls torn down?
- Why do you tap into the beautiful, feminine images of God and feminine God language in your descriptions of the Divine?
- What is one description of God that is especially poignant for you? Why?
- How has your spiritual practice of collecting names for God enriched your life? Can you give us a few examples?
- What two things are required for us to begin to name God for ourselves?
- How does a singular view of God—usually that of a White male god—keep faith and God small and hurt so many?
- What is the benefit of engaging with the Divine in new ways, as you suggest in your book?
